The Centre is managed by two environment non-governmental organizations: GEOTA and PATO, with support from the Municipality of Caldas da Rainha.



TORNADA'S MARSH

Tornada's marsh is a wetland which serves as a habitat for a remarkable collection of animal species, more notably birds, specially the migratory ones. Thus, the Marsh is an ideal place for birdwatching.

Birds like the eurasian-coot, the grey-heron and the western-marsh-harrier reside in the Marsh, and can be seen around the year. Additionally, the purple-swamphen, a priority species within the Birds Directive, can be found here.



During the spring-summer period various migrant birds arrive, such as the barn-swallow, the eurasian-reed-warbler, the great-reed-warbler and the elegant purple-heron.

By winter, there is an abundance of great-cormorants and the osprey may be observed.

Although they don't settle in the Marsh, birds like the bluethroat and the whinchat can be seen when they traverse the area during their migrations.

Occasionally, the black-kite, short-toed-snake-eagle and white-stork can be found as well.

Besides birds, the Marsh is also home to the mediterranean-turtle, the Iberian-emerald-lizard, the mediterranean-tree-frog, the least-weasel, the fox and the european-otter, symbol of the Reserve.

Concerning flora, reeds, club-rushes, bulrushes and other rushes occur within the inundated lands. There is also a great diversity of herbaceous plants, as well as bushy and arboreal formations of willows, as is the case of the grey-willow.

THE CENTRE IS EQUIPPED WITH:

- Multi-use room (40-60 seats);
- Media and documentation centre;
- Temporary exhibition room;
- Indoors observatory, based on the exhibition room;
- Dormitories (bedding for 12);
- Laboratory for experimental activities;
- Kitchen;
- Picnic/outdoors recreational area
